- Hess Farm – Geofabric blowing into pasture – put Barclays & Keystone on notice. GLB&A will monitor this issue.
- Walnut Creek/Borough Water Meter Vault – Steve has coordinated with John Barclay. Site meeting will be scheduled in the Spring to review/discuss modification to the vault to improve the situation. **Schedule for May 2026.**

Solicitor Report Agenda Items:

- Parking Ordinance – I shared the draft ordinance last month. Please advise if there are any questions or edits to the draft. Once finalized, we can advertise for adoption. This should be on the public agenda as an action item to vote on authorizing the advertising of the ordinance for adoption at the June meeting.
- If Council did not vote to authorize moving forward with eminent domain at the last meeting in April, if Council desires, there should be a vote to authorize pursuing eminent domain related to the intersection project. The vote should include authorization to pursue personal service and publication of the eminent domain process. Adoption of the ordinance will not happen until this process takes place.

Old Business

- Main Street Intersection – I provided an update in my last solicitor's report for April 2026. We are awaiting copies of the legal description from the surveyor and once in hand, we will proceed with personal service of the materials on the adjoining property owners and once served, advertise the intent to utilize eminent domain for the intersection project. A draft of the proposed public advertisement to be published is attached. The ordinance cannot be adopted until ten (10) days after the last advertisement (must be advertised two times) to allow interested persons the opportunity to seek a hearing. If there is a hearing requested, the hearing must proceed before Borough Council within sixty (60) days. The ordinance must be adopted within thirty (30) days of the last publication date if no hearing is requested and if there is a hearing, the ordinance must be adopted within thirty (30) days of the last hearing date.

The ordinance signed by Council at the April meeting should not have been signed since we had not yet gone through the procedure noted above. Council should have voted to authorize moving forward with the eminent domain process that would put in motion the personal service and advertising of the intent to utilize eminent domain. If that was not done, then Council should vote to authorize moving forward with pursuing eminent domain and authorize personal service and publication.

- 9 N. Camp Street – I advised Attorney Erik Spurlin to proceed with the estate process. I had previously shared with Donna Martin prior to the April 2026 meeting existing judgments and liens on the property. I attach Attorney Spurlin’s message with the lien balances as well as the lien search. There is a windows/doors judgment for \$20,893.00 and delinquent taxes of about \$2,000.00.
- George Herbert – The two judgments were submitted for filing at the Prothonotary’s Office in 2025. Filed copies of the judgments were attached to the December 2025 Solicitor’s Report. We were instructed to hold off pursuing execution of judgment proceedings to permit Mr. Herbert to continue making payments.
- Zoning Ordinance – This would likely be a year-long process as it would involve additional agency review.

Pending Plan Agenda Items:

- I spoke with counsel for Wynthrop Partners on April 27, 2026, and advised that Borough Council had previously approved the substitution of the letter of credit to an acceptable bond. I shared a copy of an acceptable bond form which is attached to this report. I additionally advised that the bond from the bank or issuer must be attached to the form bond and it still must be approved by the Borough.

Miscellaneous Items

- Douglas J. Baadte Notice of Mesothelioma claim - On April 13, 2026, Donna Martin shared a letter from The Halpern Law Firm dated March 10, 2026, that provided notice of this potential claim. (Letter is attached). While this is not a lawsuit against the Borough, potential plaintiffs are required to provide municipalities with notice of potential claims within six (6) months of their knowledge that a claim may exist. Mr. Baadte is likely utilizing his diagnosis date of October 25, 2025, as the marker for providing notice within six (6) months.

I was able to locate a civil case that has been filed by Mr. Baadte and the Halpern Law Firm in Philadelphia and docketed 251200444. A civil docket sheet date April 29, 2026, is attached to this report. I also attach a copy of the original civil complaint filed (attached to joinder complaint) by Mr. Baadte on December 2, 2025, against many corporations including Conewago Contractors, Inc. (Conewago Enterprises, LLC). Conewago filed a joinder complaint (attached) on February 27, 2026, joining Shrewsbury Township, Shrewsbury Borough, New Oxford Borough, Dover Township, and another corporation. Windsor Borough does not appear to be joined in this lawsuit.

Donna Martin has been in contact with Natasha Roswell, Specialty Casualty Claims Adjuster, EMC Insurance about this potential claim. I understand that the insurer has not yet made a determination on whether there is coverage for the Borough. (See e-mail dated April 14, 2026, from adjuster attached to this report). This is due to the time of exposure and not having sufficient information about the claim. We should determine the length of time that EMC has provided coverage for the Borough. We should also follow up with EMC to determine whether coverage has been determined and whether they need anything else from the Borough to preserve the Borough's notice of this claim.

- Robert Huska and Donna Martin reached out to us concerning several Right to Know requests. The requests we reviewed from the Borough include:
 - (1) Angel Lucas, foia@dataresearch.blog, March 4, 2026 – Responses were sent out April 16, 2026.
 - (2) John Garner, March 20, 2026 – Responses were sent out April 16, 2026. With respect to the information provided in this request, Robert Huska said that “someone with the state” reached out to him on April 28, 2026, and advised him that he should not be signing the Certificate of Occupancies because he is not UCC certified. He was told that the state would be sending the Borough a letter and that he was not to be signing any additional Certificate of Occupancies and that they should be signed by Commonwealth Code UCC Inspector Pete Schilling. We must wait to evaluate the letter from the state once it arrives. I attach the message I received on April 28, 2026, from Robert Huska about this situation.
 - (3) John Garner, March 20, 2026 – Responses were sent out April 16, 2026. *See* comments above.
 - (4) Doors for Dollars, LLC, March 23, 2026 – Responses were sent out April 20, 2026.
 - (5) Mark Zurada, Esq., April 13, 2026 – D. Martin sent a thirty (30) day extension notice to the requester on April 16, 2026. The due date would be May 12, 2026. The request concerns bids for sidewalks in 2022. The request form is attached.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that Windsor Borough, York County, Pennsylvania, through Borough Council, proposes to enact an ordinance pursuant to Section 1751 of the Pennsylvania Borough Code (8 Pa.C.S.A. § 1751) to **straighten and relocate streets**.

The proposed street straightening is generally described as follows:

Two rights-of-way and two traffic signal easements are sought to be acquired as more fully shown on a plan prepared by Transportation Resource Group, Inc., dated October 17, 2022, which is available for public inspection at the Borough Office located at 2 E. Main Street, Windsor, York County, Pennsylvania 17366.

The proposed ordinance includes straightening and relocating portions of the intersection at Windsor Road, N. Penn Street and Main Street in the Borough and may involve the acquisition of property rights, including by **eminent domain**, if necessary.

The following properties abut the proposed streets and intersection:

- (1) **Tax Parcel No. 89-000-02-0081.00-00000**; 2 West Main Street, Windsor, PA 17366; Thomas B. Abboud;
- (2) **Tax Parcel No. 89-000-01-0079.00-00000**; 3 East Main Street, Windsor, PA 17366, John E. Fry, Jr.; and
- (3) **Tax Parcel No. 89-000-02-0064.00-00000**; 5 West Main Street, Windsor, PA 17366, Nathan R. Yakubowski and Barry R. Rauhauser, Sr.

Any interested party may, within ten (10) days after the second publication of this notice, petition Borough Council for a hearing on the proposed ordinance.

If a hearing is requested, Borough Council will schedule and advertise the hearing in accordance with law. If no hearing is requested, Borough Council may enact the ordinance within thirty (30) days after the second publication of this notice. If a hearing is requested, Borough Council may enact the ordinance within thirty (30) days after the last hearing.

ORDINANCE NO. __-2026

AN ORDINANCE OF WINDSOR BOROUGH, YORK
COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, REGULATING TRAFFIC, ~~AND~~
PARKING, AND STREET CONTROL IN WINDSOR
BOROUGH, ~~— AND VIOLATIONS THEREOF —~~ AND
PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF

WHEREAS, the Borough Council of Windsor Borough (the “Borough”) has a duty to ensure the health, safety, and welfare of its residents; and

WHEREAS, improper and/or dangerous traffic flow and parking within the borough is detrimental to the physical, mental health, social well-being, safety and welfare of the residents of the Borough as well as visitors to the Borough; and

WHEREAS, effective control of traffic and parking within the Borough will protect the health, safety, and welfare of residents and visitors and will enhance the pursuits of life, recreation, and commerce within the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the Borough has previously enacted various traffic parking ordinances and amendments to regulate parking within the Borough; and

WHEREAS, ~~the~~ Borough Council ~~of the Borough~~ believes it to be in the best interest of the residents of the Borough to repeal ~~certain the~~ previously enacted traffic and parking ordinances and to enact ~~this an~~ Ordinance regulating traffic, parking and street control within Borough.

BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED by the Borough, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1: General Provisions.

A. Definitions and Interpretations. Words and phrases as used in this Ordinance shall have the meanings ascribed to them in the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code, as now in force, or as hereafter amended, enacted, or re-enacted, except in those instances where the context clearly indicates a different meaning. The singular shall include the plural and the masculine shall include the feminine.

B. Special Powers. The Mayor, Borough Council, and Borough Council’s Designee shall have the following powers to regulate traffic and parking temporarily and/or in time of emergency:

1. In the case of fire, flood, storm, or other emergency, to establish temporary traffic and/or parking regulations;
2. In the case of emergency public works or public events of limited scope or duration, to restrict or prohibit traffic and/or parking in limited areas for periods of not more than 72 hours;
3. In the case of street sweeping; ~~and-~~
4. With respect to the foregoing temporary and emergency regulations as set forth in subsections B.1 & B.2 above, temporary traffic signs and/or temporary no parking signs shall be posted in the affected or designated areas. With respect to temporary restrictions due to street sweeping as set forth in subsection B.3 above, temporary no parking signs shall be posted in the designated areas not later than 7:00 p.m., on the day prior to the street sweeping, and the no parking regulation for street sweeping purposes shall be effective for the following day from ~~7:00~~ a.m. until ~~5:00~~ p.m. or as designated by notice posted as provided herein on the day prior to the street sweeping.

C. Experimental Regulations. The Borough Council may, from time to time, by Resolution, designate places upon and along the streets in the Borough where, for a period of not more than ninety (90) days, specific traffic and/or parking regulations, prohibitions, and restrictions shall be effective just as if they had been specified in this Ordinance. No person shall drive or park a vehicle in violation of any such regulation, prohibition, or restriction, and no person shall move, remove, destroy, or deface any sign or marking erected, posted, or made by authority of this ~~section~~.

D. Traffic on Streets Closed or Restricted for Construction, Maintenance, or Special Events.

1. The Borough Council or the Council's designee shall have authority to close any street to vehicular traffic and to place barriers or station police officers at the end of the closed portion, or post temporary signs while construction or maintenance work is under way or a special event is being conducted on the closed portion of the street. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle upon any such closed portion of such street.
2. The Borough Council or the Council's designee shall have authority to establish a restricted traffic area upon any street where construction or maintenance work is under way and to station flagmen at each end of the restricted portion, or to post temporary signs. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle in any such restricted traffic area at any time when such area is posted with temporary

signs or when a flagman is displaying a sign directing that vehicle to stop, or is signaling that vehicle, by flag or other device, not to proceed.

E. Authority of the ~~Code~~ Borough's designated Enforcement Officer (i.e., Code and/or Ordinance Enforcement Officer) and Police Officers. Any police officer on patrol within the Borough is authorized to direct traffic and enforce all provisions of this Ordinance on the streets in the Borough, at intersections, in public parks, and in other places where the Vehicle Code and/or this Ordinance applies. In addition to any police officer on patrol within the Borough, the Borough's designated enforcement officer Code Enforcement Officer is authorized to enforce the provisions of this Section 1 and Sections 4, 5, and 6, herein. The Borough shall, by resolution, identify its designated enforcement officer by title.

F. Penalties. Any person who violates any provision of this Section 1 shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine as set by Resolution of Borough Council from time to time, plus costs; provided: it shall be the duty of the police officers and/or of the Borough's designated enforcement officer Code Enforcement Officer to report to the appropriate official all violations of any provision of this section, indicating, in each case: the section violated; the license number of the vehicle involved in the violation; the location where the violation took place; and any other facts that might be necessary in order to secure a clear understanding of the circumstances attending the violation. ~~The police officer or Code Enforcement Officer making the report shall also attach to or place upon every such vehicle a notice stating that the vehicle was parked in violation of this section. The notice shall contain instructions to the owner or driver of the vehicle that if he will report to the Borough Council Office and pay the reduced sum as set by Resolution of Borough Council from time to time, that act will save the violator from prosecution and from payment of the fine and costs prescribed in the first sentence of this subsection.~~

SECTION 2: Speed Limits.

A. Safe Speed. No person shall drive a vehicle anywhere in the Borough at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions and having regard to the actual and potential hazards then existing, nor at a speed greater than will permit the driver to bring his vehicle to a stop within the assured clear distance ahead.

B. Maximum Speeds. With the exception of West First Avenue, East First Avenue, South Avenue, West Gay Street, and East Gay Street, maximum speeds within the Borough in excess of twenty-five (25) miles per hour on all streets, highways, and alleys, exclusive of state highways, shall be unlawful. The maximum speed on West First Avenue, East First Avenue, South Avenue, West Gay Street, and East Gay Street shall be fifteen (15) miles per hour.

C. **Signage.** Official signs indicating maximum speeds shall be erected facing the traffic to be controlled which signs shall be posted according to the Vehicle Code.

D. **Penalties.** Violations of this Section 2 constitute a violation of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code, and the procedure and penalties established by said Vehicle Code shall apply to the prosecution ~~and fining of~~ the person charged and found guilty of such violation.

SECTION 3: Traffic Regulations.

A. **Motor Vehicles Not to Be Driven on Sidewalks.** No person shall operate any motor vehicle longitudinally upon any sidewalk in the Borough; nor shall any person operate any vehicle upon or across any sidewalk except in order to gain access to, or egress from, a driveway or alley at such locations where the curb, if such sidewalk is curbed, shall have been properly cut down for the purpose.

B. **U-Turns Prohibited.** No operator of any vehicle shall make a U-turn upon any street in the Borough.

C. **One-way Streets Established.** The following portions of streets in the Borough are hereby designated as one-way streets:

1. On Heindel Avenue from West Main Street to West Gay Street, vehicular traffic is to move in the north-bound direction only.
2. On Herman Avenue from West Main Street to West Gay Street, vehicular traffic is to move in a south-bound direction only.
3. On College Avenue from West Main Street to West First Avenue, vehicular traffic is to move in a north-bound direction only.
4. On Patterson Avenue from East Main Street to East First Avenue, vehicular traffic is to move in a south-bound direction only.

D. **Penalties.** Violations of this Section 3 constitute a violation of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code, and the procedure and penalties established by said Vehicle Code shall apply to the prosecution ~~and fining of~~ the person charged and found guilty of such violation.

SECTION 4: Manner of Parking; Parking Prohibited at All Times.

A. **Parking Within Lines.** Wherever a space is marked off on any street for the parking of an individual vehicle, every vehicle parked ~~there~~ shall be parked wholly within the lines bounding that space, and it shall be a violation of this Part for any person to park a vehicle or allow it to remain parked otherwise.

B. **No Stopping, Standing, or Parking; Parallel Parking.** Except when necessary in obedience to traffic regulations, police instructions, or traffic signs or signals, the operator of a vehicle shall not stop, stand, or park such vehicle on the highway, street, or

alley other than parallel with the edge of the highway, street, or alley headed in the direction of traffic, and with the curb side of the vehicle within six (6) inches of the edge of the highway, street, alley, or curb, if curbing exists at such location. Vehicles, which because of the type of construction cannot load or unload parallel to the curb, shall be exempt from the requirement set forth in this subsection, while loading or unloading only. No vehicle shall be parked at an angle to the curb on any street or alley.

C. Parking Prohibited. Parking shall be prohibited at all times in the following locations:

1. At any place where parking is prohibited by any provision of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. § 101, <i>et seq.</i> , as now in force, or as hereafter amended, enacted, or re-enacted. This prohibition includes, without limitation, parking within 15 feet of a fire hydrant or parking within a space designated for handicapped parking only.
2. Where such parking does not leave sufficient space on the street to permit the passage of another motor vehicle.
3. On the South side of Water Street from Meyers Avenue to the end of Water Street.

- 2.It shall be unlawful to throw or place snow, ice, water, dirt, gravel or stones on any street located within the Borough, provided, however, that the Borough, through its employees, agents or assigns may place such materials as gravel, cinders and salt upon the street as required for safe transportation during icy and snow covered conditions.
- 3.It shall be unlawful to place any object in a street within the Borough that would impede traffic or otherwise obstruct parking on a public street.

B. Penalties. Any person who violates any provision of this Section 6 shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine as set by Resolution of Borough Council from time to time, plus costs; provided: it shall be the duty of the police officers and/or of the Borough's designated enforcement officer to report to the appropriate official all violations of any provision of this

section, indicating, in each case: the section violated; the license number of the vehicle involved in the violation; the location where the violation took place; and any other facts that might be necessary in order to secure a clear understanding of the circumstances attending the violation.

SECTION 76: Severability. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such holding shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application and, to this end, the provisions of this Ordinance are declared severable.

SECTION 87: Repealer. This Ordinance explicitly Repeals Ordinance Nos. 1-2021; 4-1991; 1-1997; and 2-1999. All ordinances or parts of ordinances that are inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 9: Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect immediately in accordance with law.

ORDINANCE NO. 1-2021

AN ORDINANCE OF WINDSOR BOROUGH, YORK COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, REGULATING TRAFFIC AND PARKING IN WINDSOR BOROUGH, AND VIOLATIONS THEREOF AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF

WHEREAS, the Borough Council of Windsor Borough (the "Borough") has a duty to ensure the health, safety, and welfare of its residents; and

WHEREAS, improper and/or dangerous traffic flow and parking within the borough is detrimental to the physical, mental health, social well-being, safety and welfare of the residents of the Borough as well as visitors to the Borough; and

WHEREAS, effective control of traffic and parking within the Borough will protect the health, safety, and welfare of residents and visitors and will enhance the pursuits of life, recreation, and commerce within the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the Borough has previously enacted various traffic parking ordinances and amendments to regulate parking within the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Council of the Borough believes it to be in the best interest of the residents of the Borough to repeal the previously enacted traffic and parking ordinances and to enact an ordinance regulating parking within Borough.

BE IT ENACTED AND ORDAINED by the Borough, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the authority of the same, as follows:

SECTION 1: General Provisions.

A. Definitions and Interpretations. Words and phrases as used in this Ordinance shall have the meanings ascribed to them in the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code, as now in force, or as hereafter amended, enacted, or re-enacted, except in those instances where the context clearly indicates a different meaning. The singular shall include the plural and the masculine shall include the feminine.

B. Special Powers. The Mayor, Borough Council, and Borough Council's Designee shall have the following powers to regulate traffic and parking temporarily and/or in time of emergency:

1. In the case of fire, flood, storm, or other emergency, to establish temporary traffic and/or parking regulations;
2. In the case of emergency public works or public events of limited scope or duration, to restrict or prohibit traffic and/or parking in limited areas for periods of not more than 72 hours;
3. In the case of street sweeping.

4. With respect to the foregoing temporary and emergency regulations as set forth in subsections B.1 & B.2 above, temporary traffic signs and/or temporary no parking signs shall be posted in the affected or designated areas. With respect to temporary restrictions due to street sweeping as set forth in subsection B.3 above, temporary no parking signs shall be posted in the designated areas not later than 7:00 p.m., on the day prior to the street sweeping, and the no parking regulation for street sweeping purposes shall be effective for the following day from 7:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.

C. Experimental Regulations. The Borough Council may, from time to time, by Resolution, designate places upon and along the streets in the Borough where, for a period of not more than ninety (90) days, specific traffic and/or parking regulations, prohibitions, and restrictions shall be effective just as if they had been specified in this Ordinance. No person shall drive or park a vehicle in violation of any such regulation, prohibition, or restriction, and no person shall move, remove, destroy, or deface any sign or marking erected, posted, or made by authority of this section.

D. Traffic on Streets Closed or Restricted for Construction, Maintenance, or Special Events.

1. The Borough Council or the Council's designee shall have authority to close any street to vehicular traffic and to place barriers or station police officers at the end of the closed portion, or post temporary signs while construction or maintenance work is under way or a special event is being conducted on the closed portion of the street. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle upon any such closed portion of such street.
2. The Borough Council or the Council's designee shall have authority to establish a restricted traffic area upon any street where construction or maintenance work is under way and to station flagmen at each end of the restricted portion, or to post temporary signs. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive a vehicle in any such restricted traffic area at any time when such area is posted with temporary signs or when a flagman is displaying a sign directing that vehicle to stop, or is signaling that vehicle, by flag or other device, not to proceed.

E. Authority of the Code Enforcement Officer and Police Officers. Any police officer on patrol within the Borough is authorized to direct traffic on the streets in the Borough, at intersections, in public parks, and in other places where the Vehicle Code and/or this Ordinance applies. In addition to any police officer on patrol within the Borough, the Code Enforcement Officer authorized to enforce the provisions of this Section 1 and Sections 4, 5, and 6, herein.

F. Penalties. Any person who violates any provision of this Section 1 shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine as set by Resolution of Borough Council from time to time, plus costs; provided: it shall be the duty of the police officers and/or of the Code Enforcement Officer to report to the appropriate official all violations of any provision of this section, indicating, in each case: the section violated; the license number of the vehicle involved in the violation; the location where the violation took place; and any other facts that might be necessary in order to secure a clear understanding of the circumstances attending the violation. SECTION 2: Speed Limits.

A. Safe Speed. No person shall drive a vehicle anywhere in the Borough at a speed greater than is reasonable and prudent under the conditions and having regard to the actual and potential hazards then existing, nor at a speed greater than will permit the driver to bring his vehicle to a stop within the assured clear distance ahead.

B. Maximum Speeds. With the exception of West First Avenue, East First Avenue, South Avenue, West Gay Street, and East Gay Street, maximum speeds within the Borough in excess of twenty-five (25) miles per hour on all streets, highways, and alleys, exclusive of state highways, shall be unlawful. The maximum speed on West First Avenue, East First Avenue, South Avenue, West Gay Street, and East Gay Street shall be fifteen (15) miles per hour. *(6 New streets?)*

C. Signage. Official signs indicating maximum speeds shall be erected facing the traffic to be controlled which signs shall be posted according to the Vehicle Code.

D. Penalties. Violations of this Section 2 constitute a violation of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code, and the procedure and penalties established by said Vehicle Code shall apply to the prosecution and fining of the person charged and found guilty of such violation.

SECTION 3: Traffic Regulations.

A. Motor Vehicles Not to Be Driven on Sidewalks. No person shall operate any motor vehicle longitudinally upon any sidewalk in the Borough; nor shall any person operate any vehicle upon or across any sidewalk except in order to gain access to, or egress from, a driveway or alley at such locations where the curb, if such sidewalk is curbed, shall have been properly cut down for the purpose.

B. U-Turns Prohibited. No operator of any vehicle shall make a U-turn upon any street in the Borough.

C. One-way Streets Established. The following portions of streets in the Borough are hereby designated as one-way streets:

1. On Heindel Avenue from West Main Street to West Gay Street, vehicular traffic is to move in the north-bound direction only.
2. On Herman Avenue from West Main Street to West Gay Street, vehicular traffic is to move in a south-bound direction only.
3. On College Avenue from West Main Street to West First Avenue, vehicular traffic is to move in a north-bound direction only.
4. On Patterson Avenue from East Main Street to East First Avenue, vehicular traffic is to move in a south-bound direction only.

D. Penalties. Violations of this Section 3 constitute a violation of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code, and the procedure and penalties established by said Vehicle Code shall apply to the prosecution and fining of the person charged and found guilty of such violation.

SECTION 4: Manner of Parking; Parking Prohibited at All Times.

A. Parking Within Lines. Wherever a space is marked off on any street for the parking of an individual vehicle, every vehicle parked there shall be parked wholly within the lines bounding that space, and it shall be a violation of this Part for any person to park a vehicle or allow it to remain parked otherwise.

B. No Stopping, Standing, or Parking; Parallel Parking. Except when necessary in obedience to traffic regulations, police instructions, or traffic signs or signals, the operator of a vehicle shall not stop, stand, or park such vehicle on the highway, street, or alley other than parallel with the edge of the highway, street, or alley headed in the direction of traffic, and with the curb side of the vehicle within six (6) inches of the edge of the highway, street, alley, or curb, if curbing exists at such location. Vehicles, which because of the type of construction cannot load or unload parallel to the curb, shall be exempt from the requirement set forth in this subsection, while loading or unloading only. No vehicle shall be parked at an angle to the curb on any street or alley.

C. Parking Prohibited. Parking shall be prohibited at all times in the following locations:

1. At any place where parking is prohibited by any provision of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code, 75 Pa.C.S. § 101, <i>et seq.</i> , as now in force, or as hereafter amended, enacted, or re-enacted. This prohibition includes, without limitation, parking within 15 feet of a fire hydrant or parking within a space designated for handicapped parking only.
2. Where such parking does not leave sufficient space on the street to permit the passage of another motor vehicle.
3. On the South side of Water Street from Meyers Avenue to the end of Water Street.
4. Both sides of Mark Avenue from West Gay Street to North Camp Street.
5. Both sides of Herman Avenue from West Main Street to West Gay Street.
6. Both sides of Heindel Avenue from West Main Street to West High Street.
7. Both sides of Gable Avenue from West Gay Street to South Avenue.
8. Both sides of South Avenue from Gable Avenue to North Camp Street, excepting the south side of South Avenue in front of the properties numbered 20 South Avenue and 22 South Avenue, where parking shall be permitted as long as there is sufficient space to allow the passage of motor vehicles.

Any person who violates any provision of this Section 6 shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to pay a fine as set by Resolution of Borough Council from time to time, plus costs; provided: it shall be the duty of the police officers and/or of the Code Enforcement Officer to report to the appropriate official all violations of any provision of this section, indicating, in each case: the section violated; the license number of the vehicle involved in the violation; the location where the violation took place; and any other facts that might be necessary in order to secure a clear understanding of the circumstances attending the violation. ~~The police officer or Code Enforcement Officer making the report shall also attach to or place upon every such vehicle a notice stating that the vehicle was parked in violation of this section. The notice shall contain instructions to the owner or driver of the vehicle that if he will report to the Borough Council Office and pay the reduced sum as set by Resolution of~~

Penalty

Borough Council from time to time, that act will save the violator from prosecution and from payment of the fine and costs prescribed in the first sentence of this subsection

SECTION 7: Severability. If any provision of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such holding shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this Ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application and, to this end, the provisions of this Ordinance are declared severable.


SECTION 8: Repealer. This Ordinance explicitly Repeals Ordinance Nos. 4-91; 1-97; and 2-99. All ordinances or parts of ordinances that are inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 9: Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect immediately in accordance with law.


